CARPENTERSVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT INVOLVEMENT IN MULTI-AGENCY TASK FORCES

The Carpentersville Police Department is actively involved in local and state task force/organizations that provide the Village Police Department with personnel and equipment, which would not otherwise be possible. Additionally, the involvement aids the Village in creating a significant cost savings by sharing equipment and manpower. Below are the task forces/ organizations the Police Department belongs to:

ILEAS (Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System) - was created to meet the needs of local law enforcement throughout the State of Illinois in matters of mutual aid, emergency response and the combining of resources for public safety and terrorism

prevention and response. ILEAS is a consortium of over 900 local governments.

Kane County Major Crime Task Force – Kane County Law Enforcement Agencies form this group to put together experienced detectives and crime scene specialists who can work as a large team or small units to independently investigate a major crime or offer manpower assistance to departments as they investigate a major crime.

KCART (Kane County Accident Reconstruction Team) is a team of police professionals who are certified in crash reconstruction as well as scene investigators.

Both levels of investigators apply the basics of math and physics to determine what happened at a crash scene.

NIPAS (Northern Illinois Police Alarm System) is the professionally trained SWAT Team for Northern Illinois. When called into service, NIPAS has all the tools and manpower necessary to safely address any emergency situation.

NEMRT (North East Multi-Regional Training) provides in-service training to law enforcement personnel throughout the metropolitan Chicagoland area. NEMRT offers a wide variety of training and certification for our police officers at a reasonable cost.

The Carpentersville Police Department will be teaming with the Boys and Girls Club of Dundee Township this fall. FIRE PREVENTION WEEK: “EVERY SECOND COUNTS: PLAN 2 WAYS OUT”

During the event of a fire, every second counts. This year, Fire Prevention Week is focusing on creating safe escape plans to remind community members that being prepared is important. Below are tips to follow for an escape plan.

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave – this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

2017 HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Carpentersville residents will observe Halloween on Tuesday, October 31, with “trick-or-treat” hours from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. The Carpentersville Police Department recognizes that Halloween is one of the most enjoyable days of the year for children, but parents should be aware of the potential risks that may affect children who are not supervised properly. Trick-or-treaters should always travel in groups as well as have adult supervision to ensure that the only scary experiences children have are those associated with the spirit of Halloween. It is especially important for parents to adhere to a few safety rules for their children when they are trick-or-treating.

- Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.
- Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes.
- Try face paint instead of a mask. Masks can be hot and uncomfortable, and they can obstruct a child's vision.
- Carry a flashlight.
- Limit “trick-or-treating” to the housing area where you live or one's with which you're familiar with.
- Make sure that fake knives, swords, and guns are made from cardboard or other flexible materials to avoid accidental injury.
- Do not go inside anyone's home. Remain on the porch at all times.
- Keep a safe distance from moving cars.
- Cross only at street corners, never between parked cars, and look in all directions before crossing the street.

Halloween treats should only be consumed if they are packaged appropriately. Parents can help protect their children by making sure that treats are wrapped in their original, unbroken packages. If there is evidence that any Halloween treats have been tampered with, please dial 9-1-1 and report it immediately.

The Carpentersville Police Department also reminds motorists to drive with an abundance of caution and travel at a reduced speed in residential areas during trick-or-treating hours. Many children and adults will be walking through residential areas and may be near or on the roadway.

2017 STUDY AND DESIGN PROJECTS:

- **Washington and Spring Streets Culvert Improvements**

Phase II engineering is complete. The Village has obtained the required permits from all regulatory agencies. The project was publicly bid in July and awarded to Copenhagen Construction, Inc. Improvements include replacing the undersized culverts, utility relocations, minor bike path improvements, streambank renovations, and floodplain/floodway modeling. These improvements will allow the Village to submit for floodplain map revision to remove several parcels out of the floodplain. Construction is tentatively scheduled for summer/fall of 2017.

- **Old Town Area Roadway and Utility Improvements Study**

The Phase I engineering study is approximately 70% complete. This study will evaluate public roadways and utilities within the Old Town area. The study will provide construction costs, design options, and recommended construction phasing. Once complete, the study will be used for the final design over several years.

- **Hopi Lane Storm Sewer Improvements**

In 2016, a Phase I engineering study was completed to evaluate the existing storm sewer in areas near the northeast corner of IL-25 and Hopi Lane. The Phase II design is at pre-final stage and has been submitted to staff for review. Once complete, this project will be recommended for funding for construction in 2018.

- **Route 31 at Huntley/Main Intersection Improvement Project**

Final design is complete and right-of-way acquisition is ongoing with 2 parcels remaining. Improvements include intersection and approach widening/reconstruction and new traffic signals at IL-31 and Huntley Road. Intersection and approach widening/reconstruction will be completed at Main Street and Lincoln Ave., as well as the reconstruction of the Main Street hill section. This work will be largely funded with grant funding through the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) program and Kane-Kendall Council of Mayors – Surface Transportation Program (KKCOM-STP). Work is anticipated to begin in early 2018.

- **Huntley Road Reconstruction Project (Elm Ave. to Sleepy Hollow Rd.)**

Final design is complete and right-of-way acquisition is ongoing. This project is being completed jointly with Village of West Dundee. Improvements include roadway reconstruction and widening, new storm sewer, new bike path improvements, and new traffic signals at Elm and Huntley Road. This work will be largely funded with grant funding through the Kane-Kendall Council of Mayors – Surface Transportation Program (KKCOM-STP). Work is anticipated to begin in early 2018.



COMPLETED 2017 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS:



- **Williams Road Storm Sewer Improvements**

Copenhagen Construction, Inc. completed improvements to the existing storm culvert across Williams Road north of Kings Road. Improvements include cleaning and removing debris from the existing 36-inch culvert, installing a new inlet and flared end section on the upstream end, the placement of large rock to dissipate overland flow, and restoration.

- **Ball Avenue Storm Sewer Project**

Mauro Sewer Construction, Inc. has completed the installation of the new storm sewer for Ball Avenue. This provided a new closed storm sewer system serving the area draining to Ball Avenue eliminating nuisance flooding and drainage issues.

- **CDBG Eastside Resurfacing and Sidewalk Program**

Triggi construction, Inc. started work and is approximately 40% complete. Roadway improvements will be completed on Ball Avenue (east of IL-25) and the IL-25 frontage Road (south of Ball Avenue). A CDBG grant was awarded through the Kane County Office of Community Reinvestment, which is funding 50% of these

improvements. Improvements included removal and replacement of existing carriageway, curb and gutter, ADA compliant upgrades, 2 inch asphalt resurfacing, select base repair, and pavement markings.

- **Westside / Miller Road / Commerce Parkway Resurface Program**

Lorig Construction, Inc. has completed the roadway improvements within the Providence Point Subdivision, Commerce Drive (from IL-31 to cul-de-sac end), and two sections of Miller Road (from Randall Road to 1200 feet west, and from west of Sleepy Hollow Road to 2,000 feet east to Village limits). Improvements included select sidewalk replacement, ADA compliant upgrades, 2-inch asphalt resurfacing, select base repair, and pavement markings.

- **MFT Sidewalk Replacement Program**

Strada Construction Co. has completed the sidewalk removal and replacement of failed and deteriorated concrete sidewalk throughout the Village using monies received from the Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) Fund. This is done to eliminate cracked, heaved, and spalling concrete that pose tripping hazards.

BRUSH PICK-UP

Republic Services will continue to provide weekly yard waste collection for all single family residents from April 1 through November 30. All yard waste must be placed in biodegradable paper bags. Biodegradable paper bags must not exceed 33 gallons in size and 50 pounds in weight. Residents may request a separate yard waste cart for a seasonal fee and a one-time drop off charge, by simply calling Republic Services at (847) 429-7370.

RECEIVE A DISCOUNT ON YOUR FLOOD INSURANCE

Most residents with flood insurance automatically receive a discount on their insurance premiums. The Village participates in the Community Rating System (CRS) which is a program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in which residents living in the Special Flood Hazard Area receive a 20% discount on flood insurance premiums and residents not living in the Special Flood Hazard Area a 10% discount on flood insurance premiums. Carpentersville participated in a series of floodplain management activities in order to qualify for the CRS discount. The best part is there is no need to do anything to receive this discount. The Village has already done everything for you. Your insurance agent is notified through a national database and will automatically deduct the appropriate amount from your flood insurance premium.

As part of the CRS program the Village offers the following information on request:

- Whether a property is in or out of the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) as shown on the current Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) of the Village.
- Additional flood insurance data for a site, such as the FIRM zone and the base flood elevation or depth, if shown on the FIRM.
- A handout on the flood insurance purchase requirement that can help people who need a mortgage or loan for a property in the SFHA.
- Elevation certificates are available as of January 1, 2005.
- A link to the Fox River elevation gauge is available on the Village website at cville.org.

Direct inquiries should be made to the Community Development Department at Village Hall. Please supply the street address and, if available, the subdivision, lot and block number. There is no charge for this service.

There are mandatory flood insurance requirements for development in the floodplain, but for some homeowners flood insurance is an option. Flood insurance is highly recommended because no floodproofing measure is 100% guaranteed. Please take time to contact your insurance carrier and consider flood insurance for your home.

KANE COUNTY JUDGE DISMISSES E. DUNDEE'S SUIT OVER CARPENTERSVILLE WALMART

A Kane County judge dismissed a third lawsuit filed by East Dundee against the Village of Carpentersville in an ongoing legal battle regarding Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds and the Carpentersville Walmart Supercenter. East Dundee argued continually that Walmart should not qualify for TIF incentives when relocating less than 3 miles away from its former location. According to State law, it is prohibited to entice a business to relocate within 10 miles with special taxing monies. However, Walmart representatives had announced its new supercenter in Carpentersville before a TIF agreement was approved. East Dundee has filed three separate complaints over the last four years – all of which have been dismissed by a judge.

SNOW & ICE CONTROL

The Public Works Department has been preparing for the snow and ice season. Staff has converted trucks from summer to winter mode by installing snowplows and salt spreaders. Approximately 2000 tons of road salt is on hand to help combat incoming winter storms. The Village's Snow and Ice Control Plan consist of thirteen snow routes covering approximately 100 miles of streets within the Village. All Public Works employees share the responsibility of clearing the streets of ice and snow. The Plan prioritizes the routes in accordance to their importance in the transportation network:

- #1 - Arterial & collector streets (main thoroughfares)
- #2 - Secondary streets (residential and local)
- #3 - Cul-de-sacs, dead-end streets

Reminders

- It is hazardous to shovel, plow, or blow snow onto any public street. All shoveled, plowed, or blown snow should be piled in your yard or parkway.
- Shovel snow to the right-hand side of the driveway (as viewed from the house) and clear a pocket of snow on the opposite side of your driveway. This simple procedure will minimize the amount of residual snow plowed from the street into your driveway.

- Be sure not to shovel, plow or otherwise remove snow from sidewalks, parking lots, driveways or other private property in such a manner as to block or otherwise impede the access to public sidewalks adjacent to the property.
- Help the Fire Department by ensuring the hydrant near your home or business is kept free from snow on all sides. Please keep a clear path from the street to the hydrant as well.

As hard as we try to stay away from mailboxes, they occasionally get damaged from our plows. The postal code installation guideline for roadside mailboxes states that the front of the mailbox must be a minimum of 12 inches from the back of curb. In many cases, mailboxes are damaged as a result of snow coming off of the end of the plow. In these instances, the Village is not responsible for the repair or replacement. If a mailbox complies with the postal code installation guidelines and a plow comes in physical contact with a mailbox the Village is then responsible to make repairs. Temporary repair will be made as quickly as possible with a full repair to follow.

SUMP PUMP MAINTENANCE TIPS

Basement flooding can be extremely devastating for homeowners. It is estimated that 95% percent of homeowners who have a basement will experience some sort of basement flooding during the time they own their home. Just one inch of water in a homeowner's basement can result in thousands of dollars in property damage and potential health issues due to mold growth. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to help mitigate the risk of home flooding whenever possible. One of the ways a homeowner can do this is by checking to make sure their sump pump is working properly.

A properly working sump pump is vital to prevent basement and crawl space flooding. A sump pump is essentially a small pump that sits in a pit, usually at the lowest point in the basement or crawl space. This pump consists of two parts the first is known as a float. This float raises and lowers based on the water level in the pit. Once this float reaches a certain level, it activates the second part of the sump pump, which is the pump itself. This pump removes the water that has filled the pit and discharges the water through a discharge pipe.

Without a properly working sump pump, basements and crawl spaces can become severely flooded, resulting in damage to furniture, carpeting, and items in storage.

Residents are encouraged to take the following precautions to mitigate the risk of water buildup in their homes.

- Ensure your home's sump pump is working properly. This can be done by pouring water into the pit to raise the float so that it activates the sump pump.
- Check to ensure that the water discharge pipe going from the sump pump to the outside of your home is not blocked, clogged or frozen.
- If your sump pump is equipped with a battery backup system, which is highly recommended, unplug the sump pump from the wall outlet and pour water into the pit to raise the float and see if the pump turns on. If the pump does not turn on, charge or replace the battery.
- If your sump pump's discharge pipe is equipped with an extension pipe, make sure that it is facing away from the house. Also, be sure that the sump pump does not discharge onto or across any public or adjacent private property. Sump pumps should not discharge within ten feet of a public sidewalk or roadway. Also, where a storm sewer is available, all sump pumps shall be properly connected into the storm sewer system (Permit Required). Sump pumps shall not be connected to or discharge into a sanitary sewer.

SERENITY AND VETERANS GARDEN

Interested in having a brick engraved for a friend or loved one who has served or is currently serving in the United States Military? Now is the time. The Carpentersville Veterans Garden has 180 bricks available for engraving. Bricks are priced at \$30.00 each, and can be paid by cash or check.

The Veterans Garden is located in Carpenter Park off Lord Street. The Garden was constructed in 2002 and contains monuments honoring all branches of the military, as well as a monument honoring those who served in World War I. In addition, the garden also contains an ellipse in the center that contains bricks, which have been engraved with the names of those who have served or are currently serving in the United States military.

BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

The Village of Carpentersville Community Development Department wants to help you live in a nice neighborhood, but we need your help. You can be a Good Neighbor by observing the following simple rules:

- Keep your lawn mowed below eight inches.
- Maintain your property by keeping it clean of debris and in a sanitary manner.
- Park only on approved surfaces not on your lawn.
- Vehicles over 10,000 lbs. GVWR are prohibited from parking in residential districts.
- Trailers, boats and campers cannot be parked in front yards including driveways. Call for approved trailer parking locations.
- Inoperable motor vehicles are prohibited on public or private property.
- Minor vehicle repair in appropriate area - no major work on residential property or in the street.
- Keep trash bins stored in an approved location - garage, shed, or side or rear yard.
- Put trash out after 4:00 in the evening before pickup and remove bins by 7:00 p.m. the day of trash pickup.
- Keep the noise down - be considerate of your neighbors.
- Report graffiti immediately and remove graffiti within 48 hours.
- Do not place garage sale signs on utility poles, in parkways or other public property.
- Limit garage sales to two a year.
- Remove holiday lights and decorations promptly. There is a 60 day limit per year to display decorations and lights.
- Trim tree branches and shrubbery so they do not obstruct pedestrian or vehicle traffic and sightlines.
- Be sure your swimming pool is not accessible to unsupervised children. Permits are required for pools 24" deep or more.
- Post your address number in a location on the house that can be easily read from the street - four inches/contrasting color.
- Clean up after your dog/cat and do not let them run loose! No more than two adult dogs are allowed in a dwelling unit.
- Firewood should only be stored in rear yards, away from structures.
- Home based businesses cannot disrupt the neighbor. Call our department for information on allowable businesses.
- Rental properties must be registered and inspected. Attendance at a Crime Free Housing Seminar is mandatory.
- Before buying or renting a dwelling unit, call our department to determine how many people are allowed to live in the unit.
- Use working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- It is generally not allowed to occupy a basement as sleeping quarters.

(Requirements for basement rooms such as ceiling height, light, ventilation and exits are strictly enforced.) Check with Community Development Department if you are considering such usage. These are all items in the Carpentersville Municipal Code to help our Village continue to be a wonderful place to live, work and place. Call 847-551-3478 with questions or for further information.


