

FIREWORKS

It is against both Illinois Statute and Carpentersville Municipal Code to discharge FIREWORKS. The Carpentersville Police will be issuing written warnings and citations for the use of fireworks this 4th of July season.

Illinois Statute

The Pyrotechnic Use Act, 425 ILCS 35/0.01, et seq., prohibits the possession, sale or use of fireworks without permits granted under the act. Possession, offering for sale, exposing for sale, selling at retail, use or explosion of fireworks is illegal without a lawful permit.

Carpentersville Municipal Code

Carpentersville Municipal Code Chapter 15.14, Fire Prevention and Life Safety Codes and Amendments, Sections 15.14.070, D & E, prohibit the manufacturing, sales, storage or display (discharge) of fireworks without a Special Permit.

The permit required would need to be issued by the Fire Chief. There will be no permits issued to private citizens to display or discharge fireworks in Carpentersville.

The term "fireworks" does not include novelty fireworks, including snake or glow worm pellets, smoke devices, sparklers, toy gun caps, or trick noisemakers known as party poppers, booby traps, snappers, trick matches, cigarette loads and auto burglar alarms. These "novelty fireworks" items are legal to possess or use.

Fireworks, especially those of commercial grade, can be extremely hazardous, and serious injuries can result from their use. Even legal "novelty fireworks" can cause burns, blindness or other injuries if used improperly. Exploding fireworks can be stressful and a health concern to those in our community that have a sensitivity to loud noises. Many dogs react negatively to exploding fireworks and are difficult for owners to manage around the 4th of July season.

Enjoy the 4th of July season by watching professional fireworks shows put on by community organizations. Do not create a safety hazard to yourself, your neighbors and the community by exploding illegal fireworks.


GRILLING SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces, such as tents, they pose both a fire hazard and an asphyxiation risk due to toxic gases.
 - Position the grill at least 10 feet from combustible siding, deck railing, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Vinyl siding can melt due to the heat from a grill.
 - Keep children and pets away from the grill area. Declare a 3 foot "safe zone" around the grill.
 - Remove grease from trays below the grill. Failure to clean the grill is the leading cause of grilling fires
 - Learn how to use a fire extinguisher and have one near by.

WATER SAFETY TIPS

- Watch kids when they are in or around water, without being distracted.
- Keep young children within arm's reach of an adult.
- Make sure older children swim with a partner.
- Use fences and other barriers to keep kids away from pools when you're not around.
- Teach children how to swim. Every child is different, so enroll children in swim lessons when they are ready. Consider age, development and how often they are around water.
- Teach children that swimming in open water is not the same as swimming in a pool.
- Use life jackets when in or near open bodies of water or when participating in water sports.

The event began at 9:15AM and included an Arbor Day presentation from Special Events Commissioner, Don Cwyner, as well as a presentation on Arbor Day History presented by Jim McFeggan who works as the Village's arborist. Near the conclusion of the celebration, certificates and Dairy Queen Gift cards were awarded to children who won the Arbor Day coloring contest. The celebration concluded with the children assisting in planting a Autumn Blaze Maple in Carpenter Park that was generously donated by Wilson Nursery. The Village of Carpentersville would like to thank Wilson Nursery, Russo Power Equipment and Dairy Queen for their donations that helped make this event possible.



CARPENTER CREEK RESTORATION PROJECT-UPDATE

The Village of Carpentersville has taken great strides in managing its floodplain and protecting properties from flooding. For instance, the Carpenter Creek Restoration Project has been substantially completed and a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) has been submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for their concurrence in revising the floodplain limits. Once the LOMR is finalized, approximately 40 properties will potentially be removed from the regulatory floodplain. The Village anticipates that the LOMR will be approved by FEMA sometime this summer. If you are a property owner living directly north of Maple Avenue adjacent to the Carpenter Creek floodplain and wish to inquire about the status of the LOMR or have questions regarding flood insurance requirements, please contact Village Engineer, Kevin Gray, at 847-836-2464. Once approved, approximately 40 properties will potentially be removed from the regulatory floodplain. The Village received an Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) Section 319 grant worth \$628,000, which offset the total \$1.1 million cost of the improvements.



CARPENTER PARK COMMUNITY YARD SALE

The Carpenter Park Community Yard Sale will be held from 9:00a.m. to 4:00p.m. on Saturday, June 24, 2017 with a set up time of 7:00a.m. An alternative date of Saturday, July 1, 2017 will be set in case of inclement weather. For a small fee, participants may display

goods for sale in a space of approximately 25f x 15f in area size. Items not allowed for sale include animals/reptiles, pirated media, adult material, weapons, and food (excluding vendors). For a registration form, please visit the Village website, or Public Works.

WIPES CLOG PIPES

Moistened wet wipes, many of which are labeled as “flushable” should not be flushed down the toilet. Although these wipes are easily flushed down the toilet, they do not break down as they make their way throughout the Village’s sewer system. As a result, clogs often occur in Village sewer pipes and pumps, which are used to transport raw sewage to the Village’s wastewater treatment plant facility. While wet wipes are not the sole problem associated with clogged sewer pipes, they are a major contributor. This problem causes an unnecessary burden on the Village staff due to the Village staff having to be dispatched staff to clear clogged sewer pipes and clogged pumps. The Public Works Department kindly requests that Village residents refrain from flushing wet wipes down the toilet — even those marketed as “flushable”. Your cooperation is needed to ensure that the Village’s sewer infrastructure continues to function at 100%.

Baby wipes, cleaning wipes, and paper towels are not flushable. The only items that should be flushed down the toilet are human waste and toilet paper.

YARD WASTE

Republic Services will continue to provide weekly yard waste collection for all single family residents from April 1st through November 30th. All yard waste must be placed in biodegradable paper bags. Biodegradable paper bags must not exceed 33 gallons in size and 50 pounds in weight. Residents may request a separate yard waste cart for a seasonal fee and a one-time drop off charge, by simply calling Republic Services at **(847) 429-7370**.

YOUR 2016 ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORT IS NOW AVAILABLE!


The Village of Carpentersville has released its 2016 Drinking Water Quality Report per mandates of the 1996 Safe Water Drinking Water Act. This report is intended to provide you with important information about your drinking water and the efforts made by the Carpentersville Water Department to provide safe drinking water. Its format is regulated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency which requires the report to contain certain mandatory language and data. These informational items must be published each year within the Village’s Water Quality Report. This year, as in past years, Carpentersville’s drinking water has met all Federal and State standards. CARPENTERSVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT "FOCUS OF ENFORCEMENT"

The Carpentersville Police Department rolled out a new community based program to address both traffic and quality of life issues throughout Carpentersville. Follow us on social media every Monday morning to see where the "Focus of Enforcement" target is in Carpentersville for the week. The Police Department will be posting our designated traffic or quality of life assignment for the week to educate and address traffic safety or quality of life concerns. The Police Department encourages our residents to 'share' or 'retweet' the weekly announcements with your social media friends to get the word out on where we are conducting our "Focus of Enforcement" in Carpentersville. We are also interested in hearing from our community members what traffic and/or quality of life issues the Police Department should target through the "Focus of Enforcement" program.

BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

The Village of Carpentersville Community Development Department wants to help you live in a nice neighborhood, but we need your help. You can be a Good Neighbor by observing the following rules:

- Maintain your property, keeping it clean of waste and in a safe and sanitary condition.
- Park only on approved surfaces not on grass or gravel.
- Vehicles over 10,000 lbs. are prohibited from parking in residential districts.
- Trailers, boats and campers cannot be parked in front yards including driveways. Call for approved trailer parking locations.
- Inoperable motor vehicles are prohibited on public or private property, unless stored in a garage – this includes vehicles without valid license plates.
- Complete minor vehicle repairs in an appropriate area.
- Keep trash bins stored in an approved location - garage, shed or side or rear yard.
- Put trash out after 4:00 in the evening before pickup and remove bins by 7:00 p.m. the day of trash pickup.
- Keep sidewalks clear.
- Keep the noise down - be considerate of your neighbors.
- Report graffiti immediately and remove graffiti within 48 hours.
- Do not place garage sale signs on utility poles, in parkways or other public property.
- Limit garage sales to two a year.
- Remove holiday lights and decorations promptly. There is a 60 day limit per year to display decorations and lights.
- Trim tree branches and shrubbery so they do not obstruct pedestrian or vehicle traffic and sightlines.
- Post your address number in a location on the house that can be easily read from the street - numbers must be four inches tall and a contrasting color.
- Clean up after your dog/cat and do not let them run loose! No more than two dogs are allowed in a dwelling unit.
- Store firewood in rear yards, away from structures.
- Home based businesses cannot disrupt the neighbor. Call **(847) 551-3478** for information on allowable businesses.
- Rental properties must be registered and inspected. Attendance at a Crime Free Housing Seminar is mandatory.
- Before buying or renting a dwelling unit, call **(847) 551-3478** to determine how many people are allowed to live in the unit.
- Use working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- It is generally not allowed to occupy a basement as sleeping quarters. (Requirements for basement rooms such as ceiling height, light, ventilation and exits are strictly enforced.) Check with Community Development Department **(847) 551-3478** if you are considering such usage.

RECEIVE A DISCOUNT ON YOUR FLOOD INSURANCE



Most residents with flood insurance automatically receive a discount on their insurance premiums. The Village participates in the Community Rating System (CRS), which is a program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. This program allows residents living in the Special Flood Hazard Area to receive a 20% discount on flood insurance premiums. Residents not living in the Special Flood Hazard Area receive a 10% discount on flood insurance. Carpentersville participated in a series of floodplain management activities in order to qualify for the CRS discount. The best part is there is no need to do anything to receive this discount. The Village has already done everything for you. Your insurance agent is notified through a national database and will automatically deduct the appropriate amount from your flood insurance premium.

As part of the CRS program the Village offers the following information on request:

- Whether a property is in or out of the Special Flood Hazard Area (SPHA) as shown on the current Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) of the Village.
- Additional flood insurance data for a site, such as the FIRM zone and the base flood elevation or depth, if shown on the FIRM.
- A handout on the flood insurance purchase requirement that can help people who need a mortgage or loan for a property in the SFHA.
- Elevation certificates as of January 1, 2005.

A link to the Fox River elevation gauge is available on the Village website at vil.carpentersville.il.us.

Direct inquiries should be made to the Community Development Department located at Village Hall. Please supply the street address and, if available, the subdivision, lot and block number. There is no charge for this service.

There are mandatory flood insurance requirements for development in the floodplain, but for some homeowners flood insurance is an option. Flood insurance is highly recommended because no floodproofing measure is 100% foolproof. Please take time to contact your insurance carrier and consider flood insurance for your home.

NATIONAL POLLUTION DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM

The Village of Carpentersville maintains a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) and manages the quality and quantity of stormwater discharge in compliance with the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Phase II Permit. This program is the result of an amendment to the Clean Water Act in 1987 and was instituted to reduce pollutants from entering our streams and rivers.

HERE ARE SOME WAYS YOU CAN HELP PROTECT OUR WATERS FROM POLLUTION...

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. The polluted water flows through a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. This drainage discharges untreated into the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Homeowners can do their part in protecting our waters by keeping common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground with Healthy Household Habits for Clean Water:

Vehicle and Garage

- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface to minimize the amount of dirty, soapy water on the pavement.
- Check your car, boat, motorcycle, and other machinery for leaks and spills. Make repairs as soon as possible.
- Clean up spilled fluids with an absorbent material like kitty litter or sand. Properly dispose of the absorbent material.
- Recycle used oil and other automotive fluids at participating service stations.

Lawn and Garden

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Avoid application if the forecast calls for rain.
- Sweep up yard debris, rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.
- Cover piles of dirt and mulch being used in landscaping projects to prevent these pollutants from blowing or washing off your yard.

Home Repair and Improvement

- Before beginning an outdoor project, locate the nearest storm drains. Protect them from debris and other materials.
- Sweep up and properly dispose of construction debris such as concrete and mortar.
- Paints, solvents, and cleaners follow directions on the label. Clean up spills immediately and dispose of the waste safely. Store properly to avoid leaks and spills.
- Clean paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors. Filter and reuse paint thinner when using oil-based paints.
- Properly dispose of excess paints through a hazardous waste collection program or donate it to local organizations.
- Purchase and use nontoxic, biodegradable, recycled, and recyclable products whenever possible.
- Reduce the amount of paved area by increasing the vegetation in your yard. Consider directing downspouts away from paved surfaces onto lawns.

Swimming Pool and Spa

- Drain your swimming pool only when a test kit does not detect chlorine levels.
- Properly store pool/spa chemicals to prevent leaks & spills.

Septic System Use and Maintenance

- Have your septic systems inspected by a professional at least every 3 years, and the septic tank pumped every 3 to 5 years. Do not drive/park vehicles on septic system area.
- Flush responsibly. Flushing household chemicals like paint, pesticides, oil, and antifreeze can destroy the biological treatment taking place in the system.

2017 STUDY AND DESIGN PROJECTS

WASHINGTON AND MAIN STREETS INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS

The Illinois Department of Transportation has approved Phase I preliminary engineering. The Village has programmed the final engineering design in 2017. The design will include improvements for vehicular and pedestrian traffic, stormwater, parking, lighting, and other related improvements.

WASHINGTON AND SPRING STREETS CULVERT IMPROVEMENTS

Phase II engineering is at pre-final stage. Village staff continues to work on obtaining the necessary easements. This work included a topographic survey, floodplain/floodway modeling, culvert design, and permitting. This improvement will allow the Village to submit for floodplain map revision to remove several parcels out of the floodplain. Construction is tentatively scheduled for summer/fall of 2017.

OLD TOWN AREA ROADWAY AND UTILITY IMPROVEMENTS STUDY

Phase I preliminary engineering has begun to evaluate public roadways and utilities within the Old Town area. The study will provide construction costs, design options, and recommended construction phasing. Once complete, the study will be used for the final design over the next several years.

HOPI LANE STORM SEWER IMPROVEMENTS

In 2016, an engineering study was completed to evaluate the existing storm sewer in areas near the northeast corner of IL-25 and Hopi Lane. The final design has begun and will be completed later this year.

ROUTE 31 AT HUNTLEY/MAIN INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Final Design is 95% complete and Right-of-Way acquisition is ongoing. Improvements include intersection and approach widening/reconstruction and new traffic signals at IL-31 and Huntley Road. Intersection and approach widening/reconstruction will be completed at Main Street and Lincoln Ave., as well as the reconstruction of the Man street hill section. This work will be funded largely with grant funding through the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) program and Kane-Kendall Council of Mayors – Surface Transportation Program (KKCOM-STP). Work is anticipated to begin the later part of 2017 or early 2018.

HUNTLEY ROAD RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT (ELM TO SLEEPY HOLLOW)

Final Design is 95% complete and Right-of-Way acquisition is ongoing. This project is being completed jointly with Village of West Dundee. Improvements include roadway reconstruction and widening, new storm sewer, new bike path improvements, and new traffic signals at Elm and Huntley Road. This work will be funded largely with grant funding through the Kane-Kendal Council of Mayors – Surface Transportation Program (KKCOM-STP). Work is anticipated to begin the later part of 2017 or early 2018.

2017 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS:

WILLIAMS ROAD STORM SEWER IMPROVEMENTS

In 2016, an engineering study and design was completed to evaluate the existing storm sewer along Williams Road north of Kings Road. The project was publicly bid and awarded to Copenhagen Construction. Construction is anticipated to begin early-summer

CDBG EASTSIDE RESURFACING AND SIDEWALK PROGRAM

Roadway improvements will be completed this summer for Ball Avenue (east of IL-25) and the IL-25 frontage Road (south of Ball Avenue). CDBG grant funding was requested through the Kane County Office of Community Reinvestment that could fund 50% of these improvements. Improvements would include removal and replacement of existing carriageway, curb and gutter, ADA compliant upgrades, 2 inch asphalt resurfacing, select base repair and pavement markings.

WESTSIDE / MILLER ROAD / COMMERCE PARKWAY RESURFACE PROGRAM

Roadway improvements will be completed for the remaining streets within the Providence Point Subdivision, Commerce Drive (from IL-31 to cul-de-sac end) and sections of Miller Road (from Randall Road to 1200 feet west, and from west of Sleepy Hollow Road to 2000 feet east to Village limits). The project was publicly bid and awarded to Lorig Construction. Improvements will include select sidewalk replacement, ADA compliant upgrades, 2 inch asphalt resurfacing, select base repair and pavement markings. Construction is anticipated to begin early-summer.

MFT SIDEWALK REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

The Village continues to replace failed and deteriorated concrete sidewalk throughout the Village using monies received from the Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) Fund. Improvements will begin this summer removing and replacing select sidewalk squares in high pedestrian areas (schools and commercial centers) throughout the Village. This is done to eliminate cracked, heaved, and spalling concrete that pose tripping hazards.

MORE BUSINESSES ARE CHOOSING CARPENTERSVILLE

Carpentersville continues to experience more business activity along all three of its retail corridors.

Last winter, the former Rosati's building on Route 31 was demolished. In its place, two new retailers have opened. American Mattress at 125 S. Western Avenue opened April 11. The Northern Kane County Chamber of Commerce celebrated the opening of Jersey Mike's at 123 S. Western Avenue with a ribbon cutting April 24.

Across the street at the Spring Hill Market Place shopping center, the Chamber also hosted a ribbon cutting March 24 for Southern Belle's Pancake House. The shopping center also is preparing one of its spaces for a Pizza Hut carry out location.

Bella Bistro will open at the end of May at 140 N. Western Avenue in the Hillside Plaza. Bella Bistro is a locally owned small business offering craft beer and wine sourced from local breweries and wineries, a light food menu, and video slots. It also will be supporting the work of local artists by displaying their work for purchase.

Along the Route 25 retail corridor, O'Reilly Auto Parts located between the Walmart Supercenter gas station and Walgreens on Lake Marian Road.

Plans also were submitted for a 10,000 sf multi-tenant commercial building with space for five tenants on Route 25 between Walgreens and AutoZone near the Lake Marian intersection.

The Randall Road retail corridor continues to experience new retail options. Meat & Potato Eatery plans to open its second restaurant this August in the former Garibaldi's at 2258 Randall Road next to Culver's. The fast casual sit-down restaurant will serve traditional sandwiches such as Gyros, Italian beef, burgers as well as many specialty items.

The new Burger King across the street from Woodman's Grocery at 2169 Randall Road plans is also open for business.
